THE PLOW signifies labor and tillage of the soil, the backbone of agriculture and the historic foundation of our country's strength. THE EAGLE is a national symbol which serves as a reminder of our freedom and ability to explore new horizons for the future of agriculture. THE OWL, long recognized for its wisdom, symbolizes the knowledge required to be successful in the industry of agriculture. The words "AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION" and "FFA" are emblazoned in the center to signify the combination of learning and leadership necessary for progressive agriculture.

As the blue field of our nation's flag and the golden fields of ripened corn unify our country, the FFA colors of NATIONAL BLUE and CORN GOLD give unity to the organization. All FFA functions and paraphernalia should proudly display the colors.

Public Speaking

Public speaking contests are major leadership activities in the FFA. They promote skills of speaking to large and small crowds alike. These skills are vital to any field of business you may be entering in the future. Public Speaking is becoming apparent in more and more contests. For instance, Extemporaneous Public Speaking and Prepared Public Speaking are entirely based on these skills. However, the Job Interview Contest, and even the Computer Applications Contest uses these skills as part of their contest.

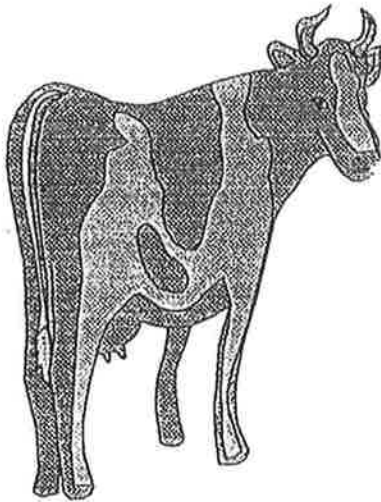
Prepared Public Speaking is just what it sounds like. A 6-8 minute speech is given to a panel of judges over a topic of the contestant's choice. The contestants in Extemporaneous Speaking, in addition to speaking to judges, must also research the Ag based topic within 30 minutes, and prepare a 4-6 minutes speech to give. Both of these contests, as well as Job Interview and Computers are open to any FFA member interested. These contests take place throughout California.

Fairs & Shows

In order to give our students an area to showcase the knowledge they have learned through their Supervised Occupational Experience Project, Firebaugh FFA competes at three fairs and shows during the year. You will find us at the Madera Fair in September, Cow Palace in March, and at Chowchilla Fair in May.

Some student projects that can be exhibited are beef, sheep, swine, dairy, rabbits, chickens, goats, plants, flower arrangements, and agricultural mechanics projects. If you are interested in attending any of these opportunities, any one of the Ag Teachers can get you started.

Dairy

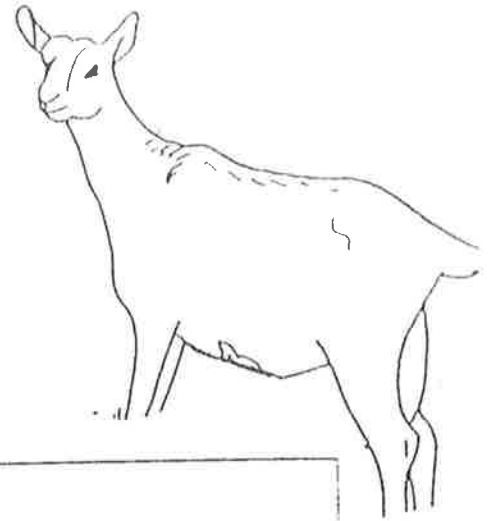


Showing a dairy heifer is a lot of responsibility and requires time. You will have your animal for the Chowchilla, Madera, and Fresno Fair. The animal is purchased in March, so you will be required to feed, water, and clean her for approximately 7 months. You will need to halter break the animal before you do anything. She will need to be tied up to a post at the barn for 8 hours, and lead to water every 2 hours. After she is halter broke, the animal will need to be walked around the ring that is provided. You will practice showmanship and wash her every other day. You will have fun as long as you learn to work with this large animal.

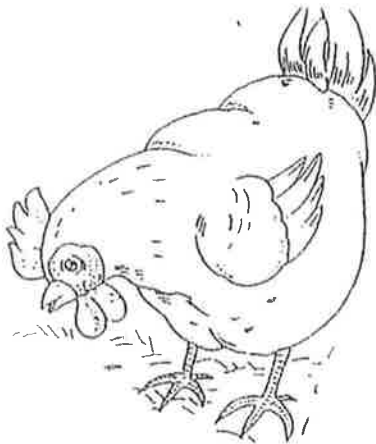

Market Goats

A goat project is a fun project that doesn't require as much time as large animals. Basically you feed, clean, and practice showmanship. While at the fair, you have to wash, feed, and shave your animal.

Poultry

The poultry project doesn't require as much maintenance, as compared to other projects simply because they are small animals. You will take ownership and care for the animals for two months prior to the fair. When you get your animals you have to feed them and practice showmanship. Showmanship requires you to inspect the animal. After you show your animal, it will go to the auction if it does well at the show.

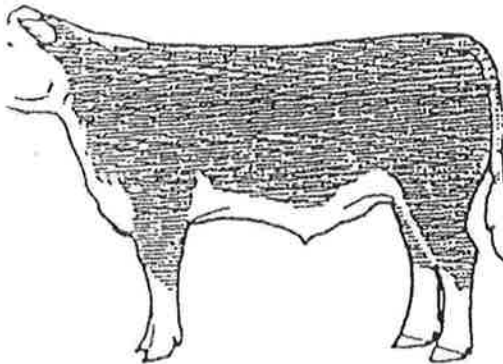
Rabbits

Raising and showing rabbits can be a lot of fun. If you are the type of person who doesn't like to work with larger animals, than this is the animal for you! There are a lot of responsibilities when you show rabbits. You have to feed and water them everyday and make sure you groom them everyday also. You can either show a meat pen which consists of three meat rabbits and you sell them at the fair or you can show fur rabbits which are used for strictly showing and you keep those as your pet and they can also be used for breeding.

Steer

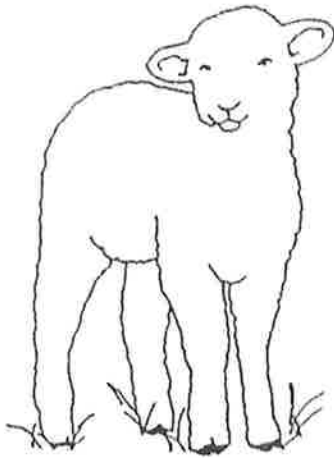


Showing a steer is a lot of hard work and you have to be willing to take a lot of responsibilities. You have to make sure you walk your steer everyday. You also have to rinse and brush the animal constantly because you are trying to make them grow hair. You also need to get them used to walking with a halter and making sure they get used to being shown with a show stick. If you are a first time shower then normally you don't want this to be your first animal that you show.

Sheep

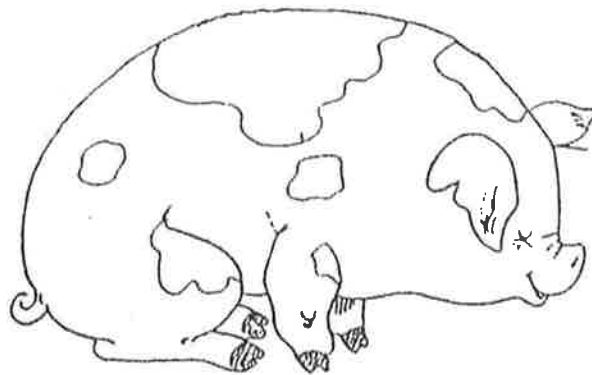


In showing sheep, there are a lot of responsibilities. When you obtain your animal you will have to feed and water your animal. After you and the animal get used to each other then you will begin to practice showing your animal, and exercise it daily. When it gets close to the fair, you will start washing and shearing your animal. There are two classes to show and compete in. Showmanship judges your showmanship skills, not the animal. In Market, the judge will judge the quality of the animal. When you have completed these shows, you will take your animal to the sale.

Swine

A swine project is a great experience. When you begin your project, you must exercise your pig everyday in order for it to maintain a quality build you are responsible for feeding and cleaning daily. As your project progresses, you begin to wash the animal often. As you approach fair time, you wash your animal every day. Before you go to the fair, you may need to shave your hog. Like other projects, you compete in two types of shows- Market and Showmanship. In the market show, the judge evaluates the animal for meat quality, and the showmanship show determines how well you control your animal, as well as how well you can show an animal.

Bank Loans

The Firebaugh FFA Students have the opportunity to obtain a loan through the Firebaugh Valley Wide Bank. The following procedures should be used to obtain a loan:

1. Acquire two loan applications from either the Ag. teachers or the Valley Wide Bank. Carefully read and fill out one form, and have one of your parents or guardians fill out the other, since you need a co-signer to receive the loan. The Ag. Boosters will also co-sign the applications, so regardless of your past credit, you will get the loan.
2. When the applications are completed, you and your co-signer must take them to the bank, together, and sit down with Barbara Barragan so she can go over the forms. It is very important that your co-signer goes with you because they might have overlooked a section in which they needed to sign.
3. It usually takes the bank a week to process the loan forms. Once your loan is processed, the bank, or one of the advisors will call you to pick up your check. It's imperative that you pick up your check immediately, endorse it, and give it to your advisors. Failure to do so may result in forfeiture of your loan.
4. As soon as you receive the loan check, take it to one of the Ag. teachers so they can deposit it in the FFA Farm Account, and clear you from your debt.

Barn Contract

The Firebaugh Agriculture Department under the direction and guidance of Mrs. Gravatt, Ms Rego, and Mr. Morales agrees to provide pen space to: _____ for his/her _____ project for the 19____ - 19____ school year.

I, _____ agree to the following terms:

1. To insure my animal prior to bringing it to the school farm.
2. To keep my pen and surrounding area clean of any unsightly or dangerous material. (manure, wire, twine, feeding bags, etc...)
3. To inspect the health condition of my animal **DAILY**.
4. That under no circumstances will I try to collect for damages or hold Firebaugh High School employees or Firebaugh FFA responsible for any damages or loss to my project.

5. Firebaugh Agriculture Department will provide pen space and facilities to students at \$5.00 per market project, \$5.00 per breeding project and \$3.00 per small animal project. Students are required to participate in clean up and repair activities upon request from Mrs. Gravatt, Ms. Rego and Mr. Morales.
6. To feed, water and care for my project between 7:00a.m. - 8:00a.m. and 6:00p.m. - 8:00p.m. or as directed by Mrs. Gravatt, Ms. Rego and Mr. Morales. If this is not done a fee will be charged of \$2.00 for feeding and for missing a scheduled workday without prior permission.
7. To remove my projects within 48 hours upon request of Mrs. Gravatt, Ms. Rego and Mr. Morales, or the review board. This will only happen if the student fails to take proper care of the project or misses 3 workdays and/or 3 showmanships combined. The student will receive only three warnings regarding improper care before being asked to remove the project.
8. The responsibility of purchasing feed will be determined by the individual advisor of each specie.
9. To sign in every time I check my project. Furthermore, I will not sign in for someone else. If I do this and get caught, I will appear in front of a review board within 48 hours. The review board will also determine if I will be allowed to exhibit my animal at the fair.
10. If the project is not removed within the allotted time frame, the project will be taken to the first available auction. The funds from the sale of the project shall be paid to the owner less the costs of transportation, feed and interim care.
11. To pay for the feed, vet supplies, insurance, rent, and entry fee. This will be paid in full or approved payments are acceptable if paid for by the start of the fair.
12. I understand that my project may be in the pen with other student's projects. Students may be required to feed the entire pen as directed by a prearranged feeding schedule approved by Mrs. Gravatt, Ms. Rego and Mr. Morales.
13. To participate in all showmanship practices scheduled or pay a \$5.00 fee.
14. To notify Mrs. Gravatt, Ms. Rego and Mr. Morales 72 hours in advance that I will be out of town and arrange for the care of my project.
15. To cooperate and work with all other students. However, if I have a complaint, I will bring it to Mrs. Gravatt, Ms. Rego and Mr. Morales.
16. To pay all fees/fines before the start of the fair. Also, if I have to remove my animal, I will pay all fees within 72 hours upon removal.
17. I understand that I must be "eligible" and not on the school "non-privledged" list for the duration of my project.

Qualifications:

- 1) Student **must** provide a copy of the completed application **plus** essay to the Ag department chairperson by April 20th.(Late applications & essays will not be considered)
- 2) Ag Boosters will review the applications and check for the following qualifications:
 - a) Attend a two or four year college.
 - b) Declare an Agriculture Major or enrolled in one Ag course per quarter/semester.
 - c) Have a 2.75 cumulative GPA.
 - d) Have completed 6 semesters of Agriculture classes with a C or better and be enrolled in an Ag class at the time of application.
 - e) 3 letters of recommendation from non Ag teachers.
- 3) The typed 500 word essay must be on your past history and future plans. (Explain involvement in FFA now and Ag in the future)
- 4) One male and one female will be chosen to each receive \$4,000.00 and a belt buckle. \$1,000.00 will be given each year while enrolled in college.
- 5) Student can take any 2 semesters off without losing the remainder of the scholarship.
- 6) Money is disbursed as follows:

First semester registration	\$ 250.00
First semester grades	\$ 250.00
Second semester registration	\$ 500.00
Total	\$ 1,000.00

THE OFFICIAL CONSTITUTION OF THE FIREBAUGH CHAPTER OF FFA

Article I. Name and Purposes

Section A. The name of this organization shall be the Firebaugh FFA Chapter. The letters "FFA" will be used to designate the chapter, it's activities, and members.

Section B. The purpose for which this chapter is formed by are as follows:

- 1.) To develop agricultural leadership skills among all members.
- 2.) To develop a global awareness of agriculture.
- 3.) To bestow confidence among agricultural students and their work.
- 4.) To promote agriculture career opportunities through hands-on training.
- 5.) To develop competencies in communication, human relations, and social abilities.
- 6.) To build cooperative attitudes among agricultural students.
- 7.) To encourage improvement in scholastics.
- 8.) To provide organized recreational activities for agriculture students.

Article II. Organization

Section A. The Firebaugh Chapter of FFA is a chartered local entity of the West Fresno - Madera Section of the California Association, made up of local members.

Section B. This chapter accepts in full the provisions in the constitution and bylaws of the California Association of the FFA as well as those of the National FFA Organization.

Article III. Membership

- Section A. Membership is limited to students enrolled in Vocational Agriculture at Firebaugh High School.
- Section B. Membership of graduates is limited to students that were active members in high school.
- Section C. The Firebaugh FFA is a 100% affiliated chapter with every student becoming a member of the FFA when they enroll in an agricultural class.
- Section D. No students may participate in any FFA activities unless they are members in good standing.
- Section E. The FFA advisors at their own discretion have the right to dismiss any member from the FFA organization at any time with approval of the administration.
- Section F. Membership in this chapter shall be of three kinds:
1.) Active
2.) Alumni
3.) Honorary
as defined by the National FFA Constitution.
- Section G. The regular work of this chapter shall be carried on by the active membership.
- Section H. Honorary membership in the chapter shall be limited to the Honorary FFA Degree.
- Section I. There shall be four levels of active membership in their chapter. These levels are:
1.) The Greenhand FFA Degree
» All "Greenhand's" are entitled to wear the regulation bronze emblem charm.

- 2.) The Chapter FFA Degree
 - » All members holding the degree of Chapter FFA are entitled to wear the silver emblem pin.
- 3.) The State FFA Degree
 - » All members holding the degree of State FFA are entitled to wear the regulation gold emblem charm.
- 4.) The American FFA Degree
 - » All members holding the degree of American FFA are entitled to wear the regulation gold emblem key.

Section J. Greenhand FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

- 1.) Be enrolled in agricultural education and have satisfactory plans for a supervised agricultural experience program.
- 2.) Learn and explain the FFA Creed, Motto, and Salute.
- 3.) Describe and explain the meaning of the FFA emblem and colors.
- 4.) Demonstrate a knowledge of the FFA Code of Ethics and the proper use of the FFA jacket.
- 5.) Demonstrate a knowledge of the history of the organization, the chapter constitution and bylaws and the chapter Program of Activities.
- 6.) Have access to the Official FFA Manual and the FFA Student Handbook.
- 7.) Submit written application for the Greenhand FFA Degree.

Section K. Chapter FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

- 1.) Must have received the Greenhand FFA Degree.
- 2.) Must be enrolled in their second year of agricultural education and have an approved Supervised Agricultural Experience Program.

- 3.) Participated in planning and conducting of at least three official chapter functions.
- 4.) Have earned at least \$150.00 or worked at least 45 hours and have developed plans for the growth of their SOEP.
- 5.) Have effectively led a group discussion for 15 minutes.
- 6.) Have demonstrated five procedures of procedure law.
- 7.) Shows progress toward individual achievement in the FFA awards programs.
- 8.) Have a satisfactory scholastic record.
- 9.) Submit a written application for the Chapter FFA Degree.

Section L. State FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

- 1.) Qualifications for the State FFA Degree are those set forth in the Constitution of the National FFA Organization.

Section M. American FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

- 1.) Qualifications for the American FFA Degree are those set forth in the Constitution of the National FFA Organization.

Section N. Special committees shall review the qualifications of members and make recommendations to the chapter concerning degree advancement.

Article VI. Officers

Section A. The officers of the chapter shall be as follows:

- 1.) President
- 2.) Vice President
- 3.) Secretary
- 4.) Treasurer
- 5.) Reporter
- 6.) Sentinel

- 7.) Advisor
 - » The local advisor shall be the teachers of agricultural education in the school where the chapter is located.
 - The officers shall perform the usual duties of the respective offices as outlined in the Official FFA Manual.

Section B. Officers shall be elected annually.

Section C. Officer Eligibility. Minimum qualifications to run for chapter office:

- 1.) Must have and maintain a 2.0 Grade Point Average.
- 2.) For offices of President and Vice President, the applicant must have already completed at least three years of ag classes, and hold the Chapter FFA Degree.
- 3.) Other offices require that they have completed a year of an ag class, and hold the Greenhand Degree.

Article VII. Impeachment of Officers

Section A. Immediate Impeachment.

The FFA advisors may at any time at their own discretion remove an officer who has repeatedly disregarded his/her duties by not fulfilling them to his/her best ability.

Section B. Steps of Impeachment.

- 1.) Any FFA Chapter Officer not fulfilling the duties of the office as described by this constitution will be required to meet with fellow officers and two advisors to discuss a plan for improvement.
- 2.) A written plan for improvement will be drawn up by the advisor based on the conversation of the meeting in Step 1, and will be confirmed and signed by the FFA President, Vice President, and the officer in question.

- 3.) If the officer in question still does not fulfill his/her duties, then a 2/3 vote of the executive committee will remove that officer from office.

Article VIII. Executive Committee

- Section A. The chapter officers shall belong to the Executive Committee.
- Section B. Executive Committee members may not miss more than two consecutive executive committee meetings without an advance excuse for the absence.
- Section C. The advisors shall be non-voting members.
- Section D. The duties of the executive committee shall be as follows:
- 1.) Meet regularly previous to monthly chapter meetings to plan an agenda.
 - 2.) Enforce the constitution and bylaws.
 - 3.) Recommend members for Greenhand and Chapter FFA Degrees.
 - 4.) Revise the point award system if necessary.

Article IX. Meetings

- Section A. Meetings shall be held once a month or as needed. The exact date will be set by the Executive Committee.
- Section B. Standard meeting paraphernalia shall be used at each meeting. All special meetings shall open and close with the official ceremony. Parliamentary Procedure shall be used in transacting all business at each meeting.
- Section C. Hats shall not be worn in the meeting room.
- Section D. Poor conduct will result in that member being dismissed from the meeting room.

Section E. Delegates go through an application process headed by the ag staff to be able to represent the chapter at the State Convention. Other delegates may be named as necessary in order to have proper representation at various other FFA meetings within the state.

Article X. Dues

Section A. As long as Incentive Grant funds are available dues shall be paid for all members through that source.

Article XI. Eligibility

Section A. Eligibility of members exhibiting at fairs and shows will be based on the Advisors discretion.

Section B. Members must maintain a 2.0 Grade Point Average overall to be eligible to participate above the chapter level.

Article XII. Amendments

Section A. To amend the constitution, a majority vote of the active members is required.




Section B. To become effective, an amendment must be posted for two weeks previous to the vote of the active members.

Article XIII. Ratification of the Constitution




Section A. This constitution shall become effective when passed by a majority vote of the members voting.





